

ANGELS STAR ON BROADWAY

The Guardian Angels yesterday expanded their controversial midtown patrols into the Theater District, The Post has learned.

Splashes of crimson colored the Great White Way as the red-bereted tough guys swiftly branched out beyond their midtown base on Restaurant Row.

The new six-man squad of Angels was invited into the Broadway area by an unidentified theater manager from the powerful Shubert Organization.

"He asked us to start patrolling the theater area because he was concerned about his employes going home late at night," said Angels founder Curtis Sliwa.

But the Shubert group, the biggest landlord on

Broadway, denied directly approaching the Angels. The showbiz giant said it was happy with police and its own private security force.

Sliwa said his troops will patrol the area bounded by 44th and 48th Streets and

Seventh and Eighth Avenues before and after matinee and evening shows.

The chief Angel stood on an Eighth Avenue sidewalk — accepting cheers and plaudits from passersby — as his youthful paramilitary division

fanned out on its new turf.

The Broadway contingent beefs up the Angels' midtown presence. There are already 30 Angels based in the old Cafe de France on Restaurant Row — W. 46th Street between Eighth and Ninth Avenues.

"The deal went down for us to move in" at 4:30 p.m. yesterday, said an Angel who gave his name only as Skipper.

"A guy came by and said he was from the theater owners and they wanted us to patrol their streets, too."

wife and a spokesman for the group, told The Post:

"We've expanded the safety zone.

"Why? Well, a gentleman in a suit, an older guy, stopped by headquarters. . .

"He said he was an emissary of the Shuberts. He said they wanted our help," said the woman, walkie-talkie in hand.

But Shubert Organization chairman Gerald Schoenfeld said: "We didn't meet with the Angels.

"Our streets are safe. We've always had strong police protection. And we have our own security force."

AIDS in vials of blood found on N.J. shore

TRENTON (AP) — The Health Dept. announced yesterday that two vials of blood found on the New Jersey shore this month contained the AIDS antibody, but stressed the samples posed virtually no risk to swimmers.

"There hasn't been any evidence of AIDS contamination with such samples," said Thomas Burke, acting health commissioner.

The samples, which were turned over to the attorney general's office for investigation, were discovered on June 3 or 4, Burke said at a hastily called afternoon news conference.

One vial was found on Ortleigh Beach, while the other was discovered on the north side of Island Beach State Park, both in Ocean County.

Beach patrols discovered five glass tubes, about five inches long and less than an inch in diameter, which contained coagulated blood, said Burke.

Presence of the AIDS antibody means the blood came from individuals who have the AIDS virus and will probably develop the fatal disease, said Burke.
